





Alicia's refusal to talk, or give any kind of explanation, turns a domestic tragedy into something far grander, a mystery that captures the public imagination and casts Alicia into notoriety. The price of her art skyrockets, and she, the silent patient, is hidden away from the tabloids and spotlight at the Grove, a secure forensic unit in North London.



One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest by Ken Kesey Tyrannical Nurse Ratched rules her ward in an Oregon State mental hospital with a strict and unbending routine, unopposed by her patients, who remain cowed by mind-numbing medication and the threat of electric shock therapy. But her regime is disrupted by the arrival of McMurphy - the swaggering, fun-loving trickster with a devilish grin who resolves to oppose her rules on behalf of his fellow inmates. His struggle is seen through the eyes of Chief Bromden, a seemingly mute half-Indian patient who understands McMurphy's heroic attempt to do battle with the powers that keep them imprisoned. Ken Kesey's extraordinary first novel is an exuberant, ribald and devastatingly honest portrayal of the boundaries between sanity and madness.

This novel is shockingly powerful. Although it does have some very funny moments, it deals with some very serious dark undertones. It is a more challenging read due to the authorial voice but this is necessary to fully appreciate the intense characters who are bound within the walls of the psychiatric hospital. The book is compelling as it gives an insight of the horrors that abound on a psychiatrist ward and the norms that were accepted during this time period. Not to mention that this book was made into a fantastic movie starring one of my favourite actors: Jack Nicholson.
