Do you know what all the terms mean? How can you improve your understanding?



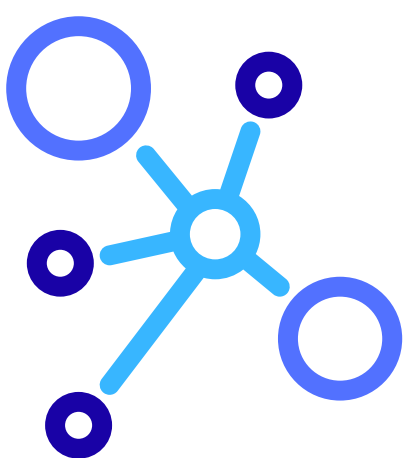
Identify the provenance of a source.

What claims does the author make? What evidence does the author use? How does the language indicate the author's perspective?

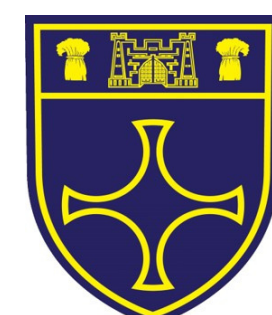


Look for links with things you already know.
